PRODUCTION

The first three quarters of the fiscal year were going well with Production Services, but as with other VR Business Services, Production was adversely affected by COVID-19. Warehousing and Fulfillment for Parker Lord Corporation, Pen assembly, Printing and Bulk Mail services have all experienced severe reductions in products and services, resulting in temporary lay-offs and attrition of disabled employees' hours. One contract loss was directly attributed to COVID.

Woodworking Production services for Atlas Corporation remained steady throughout the pandemic.

CUSTODIAL SERVICES CARPETING & FLOORING

CUSTODIAL SERVICES

Custodial Services for VR Business Services pre-COVID-19 was continuing to expand its contract services. However, the pandemic resulted in the restrictive closure of several locations under contract and this resulted in the layoffs of some VROCP disabled employees. Initially these employees remained on the payroll while Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) funds were available. During the initial period of restrictions, Custodial Services purchased some state-of-the-art disinfecting equipment, leading to some state facility contracts, and moving forward will allow the department to bid on additional contracts.

CARPETING AND FLOORING SERVICES

Carpeting and Flooring Installations for VR Business Services was in the position requiring additional crews to be hired (disabled employees), prior to the COVID-19 pandemic. COVID restrictions resulted in more than 50% of the contract locations placed on hold until further notice. Current VROCP employees received compensation with Paycheck Protection Program funding while it remained available; services have resumed to some extent. Recruited employees are no longer necessary until notice of pending contracts. Future fulfillment of all contract obligations is anticipated.





ACCESS TECHNOLOGY

The Access Technology Department instructs individuals who are blind or visually impaired how to use new technologies to their advantage.




